

ECA-NVAO Winter Seminar 2016: Quality Assurance of Cross-Border Higher Education



On 15 and 16 December 2016 the ECA-NVAO Winter Seminar was held. On 15 December the seminar took place in the Kurhaus in The Hague. The day started with a smaller seminar for the recipients of the ECA Certificate for Quality in Internationalisation (CeQuInt) and representatives of ECA. Dr Laura Rumbley from Boston College, Center for International Higher Education gave an overview of recent developments related to the quality of internationalisation. Hendrik Jan Hobbes from EP-Nuffic presented the plan for linking the MINT tool to the CeQuInt framework. Finally, a discussion in small groups was held to elaborate on experiences, challenges and knowledge exchange with regard to CeQuInt. The presentations can be viewed here.



In the afternoon the ECA-NVAO seminar on Quality Assurance of Cross-Border Higher Education took place with nearly 100 registered participants. Ann Verreth, Vice-Chair of NVAO, chaired the event. The keynote on new developments in cross-border higher education was delivered by Carolyn Campbell from the Observatory on

Borderless Higher Education. Three higher education institutions presented their perspectives on the QA of their international branch campuses: Ghent University (Kristiaan Versluys), ESSEC (Christian Koenig), and Stenden University of Applied Sciences (Dymphi van der Hoeven and Maureen van der Meché). The first results of a survey on QA of CBHE among ECA member agencies were presented by Solange Pisarz (HCERES) and Maciej Markowski (PKA). Fabrizio Trifiro from QAA explained the different approaches to quality assurance of TNE taken around the world.



Axel Aerden (NVAO) moderated a panel discussion among stakeholders (Kristiaan Versluys, Blazhe Todorovski/<u>ESU</u>, Colin Tück/<u>EQAR</u>, Melissa Keizer/Dutch Ministry of Education, Jenneke Lokhoff/EP-Nuffic). The afternoon ended with conclusions by Ann Verreth and Jürgen Petersen (<u>ZEvA</u>), the <u>Chair of ECA</u>. For the presentations click here.

It is the mission of the World Directory of Medical Schools (World Directory) to list all of the medical schools in the world, with accurate, up-to-date, and comprehensive information on each school. The World Directory has been developed through a partnership between the World Federation for Medical Education (WFME) and the Foundation for Advancement of International Medical Education and Research (FAIMER). It provides a comprehensive compilation of the information previously contained in the International Medical Education Directory (IMED) and Avicenna directories.

Ann Verreth co-opted as ECA Board member

The <u>ECA Board</u> has co-opted Ann Verreth (<u>NVAO</u>) as Board member. The vacancy emerged after the retirement of Lucien Bollaert. Ann Verreth was appointed as Vice-Chair of NVAO in January 2016.

Joint programmes experts trained in Vienna

Assessing the Quality of Internationalisation, 5-6 May 2016, Warsaw

Ten participants from four countries followed this ECA training which was facilitated



by Axel Aerden (NVAO) and Maciej Markowski (PKA). The training prepared participants for the assessment of internationalisation in the framework of the ECA Certificate for Quality in Internationalisation. Panels that carry out these procedures need to have at least one expert who is trained for this job. All participants have received a ECA training certificate allows participants

to register themselves in the <u>ECA Experts Exchange Platform (EEEP)</u>. QA agencies carrying out assessments of internationalisation may search the EEEP to find suitable experts.

Assessing Joint Programmes, 9-10 May 2016, Cologne

Eight participants from four countries followed this ECA training which was facilitated by Ronny Heintze and Katarina Löbel (AQAS). The training focused especially on the

as adopted by the EHEA
Ministers in Yerevan in May
2015. As a case study the
accreditation of the European
Joint Master's in Strategic
Border Management was used.
This procedure was carried out
by NVAO according to the ECA
framework from the JOQAR
project which provided an
important input for the
development of the European
Approach. The participants

received a certificate and are entitled to join <u>ECA's Experts Exchange Platform</u> (<u>EEEP</u>) so that QA agencies can ask them to carry out assessments of joint programmes.

ACSUCYL becomes new ECA member



ACSUCYL from the region Castilla y León in Spain was admitted as new member of ECA on 16 December 2016. ACSUCYL is the acronym of Agencia para la Calidad del Systema Universitario de Castilla y León. The Agency is the legal external assessment body for the university system in Castilla y León and is aimed at the assessment, accreditation and certification of quality at universities and research and higher education institutions in Castilla y León. In addition, ACSUCYL can also collaborate in the processes of assessment, accreditation and certification of universities and higher education institutions outside the Autonomous Region of Castilla y León in the context of the European Higher Education Area.

The activities of assessment, accreditation and certification developed by the Agency, aim at achieving the following general purposes:

- a) To foster the improvement of teaching and research activity and management of universities and research and higher education institutions, encouraging the improvement of competitiveness and economic development of Castilla y León.
- b) To provide adequate information about the university system to public administrations, the productive sector and society in general for making decisions in their areas of action.

The ACSUCYL's mission is to ensure ongoing improvement in higher education and to provide information concerning the work it is conducting such that this may prove useful to all stakeholders. ACSUCYL is included in EQAR and a full member of ENQA.

ECA welcomes ACSUCYL as its 18th member agency.

ACPUA becomes 17th ECA member



ACPUA from the region Aragon in Spain was admitted as new member of ECA on 30 June 2016. ACPUA is the acronym of Agencia de Calidad y Prospectiva Universitaria de Aragón or in English Aragon Agency for Quality Assurance and Strategic Foresight in Higher Education. At the meeting in Santiago de Compostela ACPUA was represented by the Director Antonio Serrano González.

ACPUA was created by the Aragon Higher Education Act (art. 84) to be an instrument "to promote the improvement of the quality of the Aragon university system". Following this legal mandate, ACPUA's activity can be classified in three areas:

- 1) Quality assurance: quality assurance evaluations and reviews in three fields: programmes, institutions and research. Progressively, ACPUA has developed new evaluation tasks within each of them; programme evaluation is the most relevant one.
- 2)Strategic foresight: ACPUA develops different types of reports and studies to support higher education policy decisions upon request of the Aragon Government, as well as research studies on key topics upon the authority's request.
- 3) Outreach activities: ACPUA supplements its QA and strategic foresight activity through a complementary mission: promoting quality in higher education by organizing seminars, collaborating with other entities through networks, participating in higher education events, etc.

ECA welcomes ACPUA as the <u>17th member agency</u>.

First accreditation of joint programme with European Approach



The bachelor's programme International Teacher Education for Primary Schools (ITEps) provided by Stenden University of Applied Sciences is the first joint programme accredited according to the European Approach for Quality Assurance of Joint Programmes. Bengaluru Statement on Next-Generation Quality Assurance



In October 2016 the Bengaluru Statement 2016 on Next-Generation Quality Assurance of Higher Education: A Shared Vision and Commitment for Fostering Partnership Beyond Borders" was issued. The statement was the culmination of the global summit organised by NAAC and APQN in Bengaluru (India). Over 120 delegates including 23 representatives of about 20 countries attended this global summit.

The Bengaluru statement includes a call to enhance actions with regard to mutual recognition of qualifications and accreditation decisions, issues that ECA has been working on for the past decade and would like to discuss further with regional networks. The statement also calls for the development of regional and global databases of recognised accreditation bodies and accredited higher education institutions. The database <u>Qrossroads</u> as developed by ECA fits in to this call. ECA's representative Ronny Heintze from <u>AQAS</u> (Germany) held a presentation at the conference, including the explanation regarding the ECA <u>Certificate for Quality in Internationalisation</u>.

The World Maritime University (WMU) in Malmö, Sweden is a postgraduate maritime university founded by IMO, a specialized agency of the United Nations. The Swedish Ministry of Education and Research has recognized WMU as having the authority to grant degrees in Sweden and the WMU's Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy programmes in Maritime Affairs have been unconditionally accredited by ECA member agency the Central Evaluation and Accreditation Agency of Hanover (ZEvA).

My first 100 days: Impressions from American Higher Education



On September 1, 2015 I started as professor and director of the Center for International Higher Education (CIHE) at the Lynch School of Education, Boston College. Although the center, the university and the city were not new to me (I was a visiting lecturer in 1995 and a Fulbright scholar in 2006 at Boston College), making a career shift from Europe to the US in many aspects is an adventure. Matters I have been writing about, the international mobility of students and scholars, became practice: visa issues, housing, taxes and other financial arrangements such as

retirement funds, driving licenses and buying a car, all were more complicated than you could imagine, but at the same time, in the end they are or will be solved and that is what matters. If everything would go smoothly, you don't get that confrontation with and adaptation to other cultures and habits, as part of your learning experience.

Joint Quality Initiative: The Origin of the Dublin Descriptors

As the Bologna Process moves forward with new Communiques, reports and actions taken we should remember that sometimes significant progress is made by a small group which then evolves into something bigger. A good example is the Joint Quality Initiative (JQI) which made an essential contribution to including quality assurance and qualifications frameworks in the Bologna Process. The Dublin Descriptors were a famous outcome of the JQI and are still part of the European and national qualifications frameworks, as well as accreditation frameworks.



Dr. Marlies Leegwater, who worked for many years at the Dutch Ministry of Education, Science and Culture and was also Head of the Bologna Secretariat, has written this <u>Joint Quality Initiative</u> – the origin of the Dublin descriptors – short history. Together with Noël Vercruysse from the Flemish Department of Education and Nick Harris (former Director of QAA, UK) she was one of the drivers of the JQI and the Bologna Process in its first decade.
